The 5th Annual EBP Symposium is scheduled to be held August 6, 2010.

RMUoHP VPAA Hartgraves retires



On September 30, 2009, Dr. Stan Hartgraves, Vice President of Academic Affairs, will retire from RMUoHP. Considered one of the greatest finds for the University, Dr. Hartgraves first started at RMUoHP as Academic Dean in 2003 and shortly after moved to his current position. During his tenure, he has been instrumental in both creating

and moving forward the University's goals. Under his direction and vision, many programs were revamped and several programs were added to RMUoHP's offerings, including the transitional Doctor of Occupational Therapy (tOTD), Health Promotion and Wellness (PhD), Athletic Training (DSc), Doctor of Nursing Practice (DNP), and entry-level Doctor of Physical Therapy (DPT). Likewise, Dr. Hartgraves led the charge to add elective tracks in pediatric science, hand therapy, and aging to the tDPT and tOTD programs.

Besides extensive program development, Dr. Hartgraves also was responsible for leading RMUoHP's quest for regional accreditation through NWCCU, serving as chair of the accreditation steering committee. Dr. Hartgraves also helped create the current strategic plan and revised RMUoHP mission, vision, and core values. He led the charge to convert Doctor of Science

(DSc) programs to Doctor of Philosophy (PhD) programs, which was approved by the State of Utah. All three programs submitted for approval to NWCCU have been approved. Dr. Hartgraves developed the Annual Evidence-based Practice Symposium as well as strategic relationships with AEGIS Therapies and Hardin-Simmons University. His commitment to students and faculty was acknowledged through the institution of the annual Hartgraves Award for Excellence in Teaching, the highest award a faculty can receive at RMUoHP, which has been awarded to as Dr. Gail Deyle, Dr. Marthe Moseley, Dr. Steve Allison, and Dr. Jane Sweeney.

While Dr. Hartgraves' contributions to RMUoHP cannot be summarized in a few paragraphs, it should be noted that RMUoHP would not be a leader in evidence-based healthcare education without his efforts. Dr. Richard Nielsen, RMUoHP president, commented regarding Dr. Hartgraves' retirement, "We will miss his vision, his jovial spirit, his laughter, his devotion, and his friendship. Dr. Hartgraves, we wish you 'fair winds and following seas' and the very best in your retirement years ahead. He will be greatly missed by all."

Regional accreditation update

RMUoHP is busily working on the self-study report in preparation for the October 27 – 29, 2010 NWCCU site evaluation for initial accreditation. While the report will be submitted to NWCCU in late summer 2010, University constituents and the public will be invited, prior to the site visit, to send comments to NWCCU.

Students and alumni will be asked to participate in surveys during 2009 and 2010 as part of the University's regular institutional assessment process; other University community members will also participate in survey instruments throughout this assessment cycle.

RMUoHP moves to trimester system in 2010

Beginning in 2010, RMUoHP will transition to a trimester system for new cohort starts in all programs. Current students and programs will not be affected by this change. Everyone, however, should be informed of this process as it will affect future students.

What does "trimester system" mean? A semester in a trimester system is a standard 16 week semester with three semesters per year. While there are semesters now, the semesters vary in length and start date. University degree programs are currently developed around semesters that run independently of each other in regard to start and end dates, posting of grade dates, and tuition due dates. This means that a cohort of students could theoretically begin any week of the year.

With the University's goals towards accreditation, federal financial aid, and improving overall functionality, its movement to a predictable trimester system is necessary in which courses are offered with a concurrent start date, end date, grade posting deliverable date, and tuition due date. All groups of students will begin course work on January 1, May 1, or September 1. Naturally, variance in course weeks will occur due to holiday schedules, but this standardization will have semesters that run January-April, May-August, and September-December. The first program that will execute the new trimester system is the DNP cohort scheduled to start January 2010. Others that will follow in May 2010 include tDPT, tOTD, Nursing, Health Promotion and Wellness, Pediatric Science, and Athletic Training.

Student graduation policy update

By now, students have received and read the new graduation policy and process. Under the former policy and from a student-centered approach, the University allowed students to withhold graduation, if the delay seemed important to the student's overall career success. There was never an intention to undermine or violate any University policies or processes, but to provide superior, student-centered services. However, earlier this year, we were notified by NWCCU that a more stringent graduation policy and process were required. This type of policy is standard operating procedures for colleges and universities and is not unique for RMUoHP. NWCCU has unequivocally stated that students who complete all academic requirements prior to September 1, 2010, while the University is under the Candidate for Accreditation status, are obligated to have their degrees conferred under that status. To intentionally delay conferral of the degree so as to fall within a hoped-for "window of accreditation" will jeopardize the ability of the University to gain initial accreditation. Following communication from NWCCU, the University was tasked to update its graduation policies to correspond with NWCCU requirements. In his letter, Dr. Hartgraves explained that the University's new graduation policy requiring that a student completing degree requirements must expeditiously proceed through the graduation process. The policy provides for three graduation dates per year, which coincide with the new trimester system for enrollment in the RMUoHP academic programs (see table below). Students who are found eligible must apply for graduation; those who do not apply will have the VPAA apply on their behalf, and any graduation application fees not paid will be treated as outstanding financial obligations to the University. Doctoral degrees were awarded in various fields, including the Doctor of Occupational Therapy degree, Doctor of Physical Therapy degree, Doctor of Nursing Practice degree, and Doctor of Science degree (in the areas of advanced neurology, athletic training, clinical electrophysiology, geriatric physical therapy, orthopaedic physical therapy, pediatric physical therapy, and sports physical therapy).

The University's first Doctor of Philosophy degree in Nursing was also awarded.

Ms. Rebecca Austill-Clausen, MS, OTR/L, FAOTA, delivered the 2009 commencement address. Ms. Austill-Clausen is president of Austill's Rehabilitation Services, Inc., in Exton, PA. She is a member of Temple University and Harcum College Advisory Boards and the American Journal of Occupational Therapy Editorial Board. Ms. Austill-Clausen is a frequent workshop presenter and recipient of numerous awards for innovative quality services in private practice. The alumni speaker was Dr. Michele J. Monaco, the first graduate of RMUoHP's Athletic Training Doctor of Science program. The Hartgraves' Award for Excellence in Teaching was presented to Dr. Jane Sweeney, Graduate Program Director of the PhD program in Pediatric Science and Director of the pediatric science elective tracks of the tDPT and tOTD programs at RMUoHP. Entry-level DPT Program Update

The Application for Candidacy (AFC) was completed and sent to the printers on the 24th of August. Four beautiful copies of the 1,200 page document, along with the 70 precisely placed Tabs, were sent to CAPTE on the 27th of August and were received on Monday the 31st of August. CAPTE requested two minor clarifications and then pronounced the AFC "bona fide" on September 1, 2009. CAPTE has assigned Dr. Barbara Melzer from Texas State University – San Marcos as our on-site reviewer. The on-site visit will occur on October 19th and 20th. An internal, preparatory "mock" site visit with Dr. Ray Patterson has been scheduled for September 29th and 30th.

Over the next few months, RMUoHP is working to strengthen documentation on potential clinical sites, finish final plans for the DPT building's renovation, and send out bids for contractors to

perform the build-out. Dr. Jeff Lau and Dr. Bob Sellin are attending a Clinical Educators Conference in Denver in late September and then the Educational Leadership Meeting in Philadelphia in October. To promote its DPT program, this Fall RMUoHP is attending career days at colleges and universities throughout Utah, Idaho, Wyoming, Arizona, and Oregon.

Library Services update

Medical Library delivers 750% more articles in 2009. The Medical Library staff are happy to announce increased efficiency due to improvements in access and delivery over the past year. During the months of May and July 2009, the Library processed over 340 requests—a 750% increase over the same period last year. New library orientation to be released in 2010. Currently, library resources and search strategies are not introduced to students until they are several weeks into their first semester. We believe this will aid students in their Module 1 studies and better-support the University's mission to provide evidence-based education. Also, the earlier delivery of instructions allows for more personalized instruction, immediate

IRB corner

An often overlooked graduation requirement is for students in the DSc, PhD, and DNP programs to formally close their IRB protocol*. This oversight is most common among students working under the exempt designation as they are not required to submit annual progress reports.

This last review allows the IRB to verify that the Principal Investigator did not exceed approved enrollment numbers, change the research design, or otherwise conduct the research in a way that was not previously approved by the IRB. This communication also tells the IRB that all research, including data analysis, has been completed and IRB oversight is no longer needed. It is best to wait until after final defense to file the completed Status Report.

Upon review of the Status Report, the IRB may take one of several actions:

1. Issue an approval/closure letter stating that the file has been closed. This letter is shared with the project advisor and other appropriate individuals, such as the Registrar, Director of Research, or Graduate Program Director.
2. Ask for corrections. Common mistakes include omitting the date all research activities were completed or listing the number enrolled as still "actively enrolled" (a final report should indicate zero active subjects).
3. Ask for clarification. This might include a letter of explanation regarding enrollment numbers or other activity that should have been approved in advance.

The Status Report form can be found on the RMUoHP website or in the forms library on IRBNet. The form is submitted via IRBNet. Suggestions for future topics or questions are always welcome at irb@rmuohp.edu.

*Protocol – this is the official research plan of what you have asked the IRB for permission to do. This plan involves research with human subjects.
